## Chapple aims to answer the Red Rose's prayers

Lancashire coach Glen Chapple's message is clear ahead of 2019: "We have to make promotion our main aim."

Last season's surprise relegation in the Specsavers County Championship hurt everybody at Emirates Old Trafford.

It was made an even more bitter pill to swallow that they went down level on points with Notts, having won fewer games and been docked a point due to a slow over-rate in a defeat against Yorkshire.

It means that while limited overs silverware is also a target, the be all and end all is for the Red Rose to be playing Division One cricket in 2020.

Lancashire are no strangers to Division Two. They won promotion in both 2013 and 2015, so Chapple knows what it takes to achieve that.

"We're a big club, and every time we've been down we've managed to go back up," said Chapple.

"So in those terms, we back ourselves to be one of the best three sides, but we have to respect the opposition. They're excellent teams."

Lancashire's disappointment came after a poor year for the batsmen.

Seamers Tom Bailey and Graham Onions claimed 64 and 57 wickets respectively, with the former the leading wicket-taker in Division One.

But no batsman reached 800 runs, with new captain Dane Vilas the best with 792.

He has replaced Liam Livingstone, who stepped down earlier in the winter to concentrate on his form.

Livingstone, however, will miss the start of the season having gained a contract with Rajasthan Royals in the Indian Premier League.

Chapple, currently in Dubai on the club's pre-season tour, said: "Last season was extremely challenging for batsmen – seamer friendly to begin with and then the pitches never flattened.

"Losing a point on over-rate was disappointing, and going down on the same points was difficult to take."

## Green light for weekend race

Motorsport history will be made this weekend when the 2019 Legend Fires North West Stages Rally, in partnership with Simpson's Skoda, becomes the first closed road motorsport event to be held in North West England.

The rally, which aims to raise money for charitable causes, is going ahead thanks to the co-operation of Wyre Borough Council, Lancaster City Council, Lancashire County Council, Garstang Town Council and Parish Councils throughout the route.

Starting with a ceremonial start in Garstang town centre on Friday evening around 7pm, Saturday sees the rally start from its new headquarters at Myerscough College at 8.30am.

Competitors will then head off to the closed roads special stages, the first of which, the Nicky Nook Stage, to the east of Garstang, gets underway just before 9am.

Spectators can also catch the rally action on the Staynall Stage that first runs at 10am. Both the Nicky Nook and Staynall Stages are run three times during the day.

Friday's ceremonial start promises a carnival-style atmosphere complete with the Samba Espirito drum band of Notting Hill Carnival and New York Brazilian Day fame.

The band will play ahead of car one as it reaches the High Street shortly before 7pm, after which the Town Cryer will announce the start as cars proceed over the official start ramp.

Rally director Dave Read said: "This promises to be the biggest rally start for a clubman rally in the UK and it's largely thanks to the efforts of the Garstang Town Council and the Myerscough College Motorsports Department. The local butcher is laying on a BBQ and the rallysponsors Legend Fires and Simpsons Skodas have lots of give aways for the kids who will get the opportunity to sit in the cars."

The 120-car field includes some of the UK's top crews with the finish scheduled for the Myerscough College International Horse Arena at 5.45pm on Saturday evening.
